Upon deliberation of the Committee on Health on its meeting last August 31, 2021, the Committee respectfully recommending that this proposed resolution shall be approved without amendments.









RESOLUTION ENSURING INCLUSIVE ACCESS TO EDUCATION DURING STATE OF HEALTH EMERGENCY BY ADOPTING AND IMPLEMENTING RADIO-BASED INSTRUCTION ACCESSIBLE THROUGH RADIO BROADCAST AND SOCIAL MEDIA PLATFORMS.

WHEREAS, it is the duty of the government to prioritize education,¹ guarantee access to education and ensure quality of education at all levels² being a fundamental human right;³

WHEREAS, the Philippines is obliged to provide free and compulsory primary education, make secondary education generally available and higher education accessible;⁴

WHEREAS, the Bangsamoro Government constitutional duty to promulgate and implement education policies⁵ and "establish, maintain, and support a complete and integrated system of quality education" in the Bangsamoro;⁶

WHEREAS, the world is now facing the challenge of the Corona Virus Disease 2019 (COVID-19) pandemic that led to placing of the country in State of Health Emergency on 8 March 2020 by President Rodrigo Duterte by virtue of Proclamation No. 922 for six months which was recently extended one year or until 12 September 2021 by Proclamation No. 1021;

WHEREAS, there has been more than 33 million infections and more than one million deaths worldwide by COVID-19 and there has been no vaccine for this virus;

WHEREAS, as a result schools are now prohibited to conduct a face-to-face classroom education and instead our government must adopt suitable learning systems

and methods in order to protect the learners, their parents, and teachers from the spread of COVID-19;

WHEREAS, the government found difficulties in ensuring access to education under the context of pandemic health emergency given the constraints in the logistic and internet infrastructure as well as learners' technological and financial requirements under distance learning since face-to-face learning is prohibited during this emergency;

WHEREAS, we understand the challenges being faced by Ministry of Basic, Higher and Technical Education—Bangsamoro Autonomous Region in Muslim Mindanao (MBHTE-BARMM) but it has to bridge the learning barriers to make education accessible especially the poor and marginalized sectors of the society while ensuring quality of education;

WHEREAS, MBHTE-BARMM can adopt from Learning Delivery Modality which is an education instruction applied to a situation where the teachers and the learners are geographically remote from each other and it consists of: Modular Distance Learning, Online Distance Learning, and Television, and Radio-Based Instruction;⁷

WHEREAS, even in our mobile, digitally saturated age, radio is still the most commonly available and accessed technology across the globe and as shown in UNESCO reports where 75% of the households globally have access to radio;⁸

WHEREAS, under the current situation of BARMM, where households have available and inexpensive access to radio, Radio-Based Instruction (RBI) modality for instruction will address lack of internet infrastructure, lack of access to technology, financial, and the logistical incapacities of learners faced mostly by the most vulnerable;

WHEREAS, this approach requires Interactive Radio Instruction, which has been used successfully across the globe, that uses one-way radio to reach students and teachers (or in this case, students and their parents) by means of pre-recorded interactive lessons;⁹

WHEREAS, in order to implement it, MBHTE-BARMM should train groups of presenters selected from different districts in the division of every province to deliver lectures based on IRI in their respective area of coverage and they be trained by expert media practitioners, broadcasters, and professionals of audio-visual sectors for the production of educational programmes;

WHEREAS, there should be collaboration among MBHTE-BARMM and education stakeholders for the successful implementation of the radio-based educational programmes;

WHEREAS, the pre-recorded lectures on radio can also be uploaded to social media platforms in order to widen the reach its educational value to other learners;

WHEREAS, the MBHTE-BARMM shall allocate budget to shoulder the expenses in hiring media trainers; incentives or special allowances for the selected Presenters or Lecturers; procurement of transistor radios or portable digital radios

powered by rechargeable batteries to be given to those less privileged yet deserving students who do not have radios; and other expenses for the successful implementation of the program.

**A RESOLUTION
URGING THE MINISTRY OF HEALTH, IN COORDINATION WITH BARMM
COMPONENT LOCAL GOVERNMENT UNITS AND THE PRIVATE SECTOR, TO
INTENSIFY EFFORTS IN PROMOTING VACCINE CONFIDENCE IN THE
BANGSAMORO AUTONOMOUS REGION**

WHEREAS, the Bangsamoro Organic Law mandates the Bangsamoro Government to provide, maintain and ensure the delivery of basic and responsive health programs in the Bangsamoro Autonomous Region. It further recognizes a policy on health that provides for a comprehensive and integrated health service delivery for its constituents;

WHEREAS, as of 28 February 2021, the World Health Organization (WHO) has reported that there have been 113,467,303 confirmed cases of COVID-19 globally, which include 2,520,550 deaths;

WHEREAS, the Philippines has reported more than 576,000 infections, including 12,318 deaths, the second-highest totals in Southeast Asia. Lockdowns and quarantine restrictions have set back the country's economy in one of the worst recessions in the region, and resulting to unemployment and hunger;

WHEREAS, on February 28, 2021, the Philippines received its first batch of COVID-19 vaccine from China-based Sinovac Biotech Ltd. totaling 600,000 doses of vaccine. The initial deliveries are a small fraction of at least 148 million doses, the government has been negotiating to secure from Western and Asian companies to vaccinate about 70 million Filipinos for free in a massive campaign;

WHEREAS, the Philippine vaccine czar and National Task Force Chief implementer said that the first priority in the vaccination would be the frontline health workers, 2nd priority are the indigent senior citizens, 3rd priority are the remaining senior citizens, 4th priority are the remaining indigent population; and 5th priority are the uniformed personnel;¹

WHEREAS, however, a recent survey showed that a great number of Filipinos are still unwilling to have themselves vaccinated against the disease. Concerns about the safety of a vaccine was higher in Mindanao (78%) compared to other regions;²

WHEREAS, the number of respondents both unwilling and reluctant to receive a vaccine underscores the challenges health officials need to confront in boosting demand for the vaccine.

WHEREAS, both the public and private sectors must target communications via text messages, the social media, radio and television to different segments of the population, and recognize the need to communicate in all major languages and dialects in the region;

WHEREAS, ensuring that all residents of the Bangsamoro Autonomous Region have rapid and equitable access to the vaccines is not only morally right, but also offers the quickest way to end the crisis and put our economies on the road to recovery.

WHEREAS, the Bangsamoro Autonomous Region requires an intensive effort in building vaccine confidence, as a halal certification of vaccines is also a legitimate concern for the Bangsamoro people.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, as it is hereby resolved by the Bangsamoro Transition Authority, to urge the Ministry of Health, in coordination with BARMM component local government units and the private sector, to intensify efforts in promoting vaccine confidence in the Bangsamoro Autonomous Region.

WHEREAS, Republic Act 11054 otherwise known as "An Act Providing for the Organic Law for the Bangsamoro Autonomous Region in Muslim Mindanao, Repealing for the Purpose Republic Act No. 75A, Entitled "An Act Providing for An Organic Act for the Autonomous Region in Muslim Mindanao," As Amended by Republic Act No. 9054, Entitled "An Act to Strengthen and Expand the Organic Act for the Autonomous Region in Muslim Mindanao," do not abrogate Acts or laws enacted by the BJA of the defunct ARMM. As clearly provided in the


Final Provisions of the Law, specifically Article XVIII **Section 1**, "*Subsisting Regional Laws*. - All subsisting laws enacted by the Autonomous Region in Muslim Mindanao Regional Legislative Assembly by virtue of authorities provided under Republic Act No. 6734, as amended by Republic Act No. 9054, shall be deemed valid and in effect, unless inconsistent with this Organic Law or repealed by laws passed by the Parliament.";

WHEREAS, MMA 245 which upgraded Tamparan District Hospital into a Provincial Hospital is not inconsistent with the Organic Law nor repealed by a law passed by the parliament, hence, it is still in force and binding;

WHEREAS, MMA 245 as a valid and binding law that subsisted despite the repeal of Republic Act No. 6734, as amended by Republic Act No. 9054 by Republic Act 11054, the Ministry of Health as mandated by Section 4 and Section 5 as above-cited must ensure the implementation of the law;

WHEREFORE, it is **RESOLVED**, as it is hereby **RESOLVED**, that the BTA-Parliament is urged to adopt a resolution **DIRECTING THE MINISTRY OF HEALTH TO IMPLEMENT MUSLIM MINDANAO ACT (MMA) 245 (AN ACT UPGRADING THE TAMPARAN DISTRICT HOSPITAL INTO PROVINCIAL HOSPITAL OF LANA DEL SUR, APPROPRIATING FUNDS THEREFOR, AND FOR OTHER PURPOSES)**.

EXPLANATORY NOTES

Recruitment Agency Accreditation Act of 2019 has been crafted specifically to regulate licensed recruitment agencies operating within Bangsamoro Autonomous Region for the protection of Bangsamoro migrant workers.

Many of our Bangsamoro migrant workers are victims of illegal recruitment, and human trafficking that exploit and abuse their vulnerabilities and assaults their human dignity which cause so many untold sufferings, including their families.

Now, it's about time for the Bangsamoro Government to give protection and ensure that the licensed recruitment agencies are compliant with the rules and regulations of our labor laws.

There is a need for mandatory registration for accreditation of all licensed both local and foreign recruitment agencies operating within the Bangsamoro Autonomous Region in Muslim Mindanao (BARMM) at the Ministry of Labor and Employment (MOLE) for us to maximize the implementation and enforcement of our labor laws; to protect and ensure that rights of Bangsamoro migrant workers shall not be compromised or violated; and to secure the best possible terms and condition for them.

I appeal to my colleagues to join me in the immediate passage of this bill.

In view of the foregoing, the approval of this bill is earnestly requested.

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**AN ACT REGULATING THE OPERATIONS OF LOCAL AND FOREIGN
RECRUITMENT AGENCIES WITHIN THE BANGSAMORO AUTONOMOUS
REGION IN MUSLIM MINDANAO (BARMM)**

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Parliament Bill No.: 22

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Be it enacted by the **Bangsamoro Transition Authority- Parliament** of the
Bangsamoro Autonomous Region in Muslim Mindanao (BARMM).

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SECTION 1. Short Title. - This Act shall be known as "**Recruitment Agency
Regulation Act of 2020**".

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SECTION 2. Declaration of Policy. - It is the policy of Bangsamoro
Government to promote, protect and ensure the general welfare of the Bangsamoro
people particularly the Bangsamoro migrant workers from illegal recruitment,
trafficking in persons and violation of rights of any forms. Towards this end, it shall
strengthen the implementation and enforcement of labor laws to protect and ensure
that the rights of Bangsamoro migrant workers shall not be compromised or violated.

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SECTION 3. Definition of Terms.

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- A. Recruitment and Placement.** - refers to any act of canvassing, enlisting
contracting, transporting, utilizing, hiring or procuring workers, and includes
referrals, contracts, services, promising or advertising for employment, locally
or abroad, whether for profit or not: Provided, that any person or entity which,
in any manner, offers or promises for a fee, employment to two or more
persons shall be deemed engaged in recruitment.
- B. Private Recruitment Entity.** - means any person or association engaged in the
recruitment and placement of workers, locally or overseas, without charging
directly or indirectly any fee from the workers or employees.
- C. Overseas Employment.** - means employment of a worker outside the
Philippines.

1 **SECTION 4. General Provisions.**

2 A. All local and foreign recruitment and employment agencies operating and/or
3 recruiting within the Bangsamoro Autonomous Region whether as main
4 offices, branch offices, or sub-offices shall register and secure accreditation
5 from the Ministry of Labor and Employment every three (3) years.

6 All local and foreign recruitment and employment agencies operating and/or
7 recruiting within the Bangsamoro Autonomous Region shall establish their
8 offices in the BARMM and shall register and secure accreditation from the
9 MOLE every three (3) years.

10 B. All local and foreign recruitment and employment agencies recruiting or
11 employing workers who are residents of BARMM shall likewise be required to
12 register and secure accreditation from the Ministry of Labor and Employment
13 every three (3) years.

14 C. A Certificate of Accreditation duly signed and bearing the seal of the Ministry
15 of Labor and Employment valid for three (3) years upon approval shall be
16 issued to compliant recruitment agencies.

17 D. The Ministry of Labor and Employment shall issue guidelines relative to the
18 implementation of this Act including the schedule of reasonable fees and
19 charges for application and renewal of registration.

20 E. The MOLE shall conduct inspections to ensure compliance hereof and shall
21 from time to time publish an updated list of accredited recruitment agencies in
22 a newspaper of general circulation or in its website.

23 F. Within thirty (30) days after the effectivity of this Act, only those duly registered
24 and recognized recruitment agencies with Certificate of Accreditation shall be
25 allowed to operate in the Bangsamoro Autonomous Region.

26 G. No certificate of accreditation shall be issued to the following disqualified
27 persons and/or individuals:

- 28 1. Travel agencies and sales agencies of airline companies;
- 29 2. Officers or members of the Board of any corporation or partners in a
30 partnership engaged in the business of a travel agency;
- 31 3. Corporations and partnerships, where any of its officers, members of
32 the board or partners is also an officer, member of the board or partner
33 of a corporation or partnership engaged in the business of a travel
34 agency;
- 35 4. Individuals, partners, officers or directors of an insurance company who
36 make, propose or provide an insurance contract under the compulsory
37 insurance coverage for agency-hired Overseas Filipino Workers;
- 38 5. Sole proprietors, partners or officers and members of the board with
39 derogatory records; and
- 40 6. Any official or employee of the DOLE, POEA, OWWA, DFA, DOJ, DOH,
41 BI, IC, NLRC, TESDA, CFO, NBI, PNP, Civil Aviation Authority of the
42 Philippines (CAAP), international airport authorities, and other
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1 government agencies directly involved in the implementation of RA
2 8042, as amended, and/or any of his/her relatives within the fourth civil
3 degree of consanguinity or affinity.

4 7. Those who are found guilty of violating the provisions of this act shall
5 not be granted accreditation or registration by the MOLE.

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7 H. Those persons who will be issued said certificate of accreditation are required
8 to have the following capital requirements and ownership, to wit:

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10 1. Filipino citizen acting as a sole proprietor or partnership or corporations
11 at least seventy-five percent (75%) of the authorized and voting capital
12 stock of which is owned and controlled by Filipino citizens;
13 2. A minimum paid-up capital of Five Million Pesos (P 5,000,000.00); and
14 3. Those not otherwise disqualified by law or other government
15 regulations to engage in the recruitment and placement of workers for
16 overseas employment.

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18 I. Local and foreign employment agencies recruiting and operating in the BARMM
19 shall give preference to Bangsamoro resident in recruitment, placement and
20 hiring.

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22 J. Sections 95 until 103 of the Revised POEA Rules and Regulations Governing
23 the Recruitment and Employment of Land-Based Overseas Filipino Workers
24 of 2016 shall apply for the implementation of this Act.

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26 **SECTION 5. Prohibited Acts and Penalties.** – It shall be unlawful or illegal
27 for any local or foreign recruitment or employment agencies operating within the
28 Bangsamoro Autonomous Region and recruiting applicants or workers who are
29 residents of BARMM to operate without the Certificate of Accreditation from MOLE.

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31 A. Any recruitment agency found violating any provision of this Act shall be
32 imposed with a fine of not less than One Hundred Fifty Thousand Pesos
33 (Php150,000.00) but not more than Two Hundred Thousand Pesos
34 (Php 200,000.00).

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36 B. Tampering, alteration and forgery of Certificate of Accreditation shall be
37 imposed with the fine of not less than One Hundred Fifty Thousand Pesos
38 (Php 150,000.00) but not more than Two Hundred Thousand Pesos
39 (Php 200,000.00) without prejudice to the criminal action that may be filed.

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41 C. For penalties not covered under this Act, Section 144 of Rule IV – Disciplinary
42 Actions Against Principals/Employers of Revised POEA Rules and
43 Regulations Governing the Recruitment and Employment of Land-Based
44 Overseas Filipino Workers of 2016 shall apply.

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46 **SECTION 6. Authority of the MOLE to Suspend or Cancel Certificate of**
47 **Accreditation or License to Operate.** - The MOLE shall have the power and
48 authority to suspend or cancel any certificate of accreditation duly issued to
49 employment agencies whether local or foreign for violation of the provisions of this

1 Act and/or Rules and Regulation issued by the MOLE, or, for the violations of any
2 applicable laws.

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4 The said employment recruitment agencies whether local or foreign shall be given at
5 least fifteen days (15) upon service of notice of cancellation to explain in writing why
6 no cancellation of certificate of accreditation shall be imposed.

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8 **SECTION 7. Separability Clause.** – If any provision or part of this Act is held
9 invalid or unconstitutional, the remainder of this Act not affected thereof shall remain
10 valid and in effect.

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12 **SECTION 8. Repealing Clause.** – All regional laws, decrees, orders, rules
13 and regulations inconsistent with this Act are hereby repealed or modified
14 accordingly.

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16 **SECTION 9. Effectivity Clause.** – This Act shall take effect after fifteen (15)
17 days from its publication in a newspaper of general circulation in the Bangsamoro
18 Autonomous Region in Muslim Mindanao and/or official website of the Ministry of
19 Labor and Employment and/or the official website of the Bangsamoro Autonomous
20 Region in Muslim Mindanao.





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
